A Few Words from our President



A couple of years ago, before we hired our Interim Minister, Rev. Pam Gehrke, our congregation engaged in a process of discovery. The goal was to figure out what mattered most to us as a Fellowship and to discern what we, collectively, wanted in terms of paid ministry (no paid ministry, ½-time, ¾-time, or full-time). Our leadership presented us with a series of questions and collected an abundance of data! Two points stick out in my mind from those surveys: (1) We wanted full-time paid ministry. (2) We valued the “community” aspect of AUUF. So, Pam was hired as our full-time interim minister for two years (2016-2018), and the AUUF community that was most familiar to us - one served for over 20 years by the full-time ministry of

Rev. Diana Jordan Allende (1994-2016) - rocked along as if nothing much had changed. The reality is that to maintain that full-time ministry familiarity, we used money from our reserve funds. Perhaps it was helpful, during that transition, to maintain the sense of community that had become so familiar versus changing things even more. Transitions are hard.

Now, we find ourselves at another point of transition. We are in the process of seeking a Settled Minister to serve our beloved community for longer than a year or two. This is a rare opportunity to select the minister “just right” for AUUF. Someone who is a good fit for the long haul for our unique, eclectic, sometimes irreverent brand of UUism! Someone who “gets” us and wants to become an integral, vital part of both our AUUF and our Auburn communities. But, given our current membership and stewardship, what we have to offer a potential full-time minister is not as competitive as we would like.

And so, we come back to the proverbial table. No, we won’t be doing more surveys! But we will be gathering at literal tables. As our Settled Minister Search Committee (SMSC) continues their work of seeking our next minister, we will be sharing, again, what AUUF means to us. This fall, the SMSC will lead us in “cottage meetings” where we will talk honestly about what we want for the near- and long-term future of AUUF. We will examine our desire for full-time ministry and assess what we will sacrifice to have it. We will work to align our wants and our needs. We will think about what we give to this place and what we receive from one another as a community. We will identify what might be expected of us if we are to have a full-time minister and what might be expected of us if we are not able to have a full-time minister.

This is an exciting time for our AUUF community! By the time you read this, the SMSC will have begun leading these conversations about the future of ministry at AUUF. I hope you’ve been participating. And I hope you will continue to support the process of “visioning” the future of AUUF! It matters that you are a part of this process. You matter. Our community is special because we value everyone’s voice. Please share yours!

The name of our newsletter, The Ebenezer Star, was inspired by the original purpose of the building in which the Auburn Unitarian Universalist Fellowship meets and an architectural feature on its ceiling. Newly freed black women and men constructed this building as a place of worship for their Ebenezer Baptist congregation. Inside, a hand-carved, four-pointed star is the unique focal point of the beautiful ceiling. It is our hope that The Ebenezer Star will serve – as storied stars often do – as a guide for navigating your journey while finding connection, meaning, and community.

Reflections on Small Group Ministry (Amplified)

The beginning of my UU small group ministry work parallels the formal beginnings of the small group ministry movement within Unitarian Universalism. My own participation led to my evangelism (not a word I use often as a Jewish UU) for the transformative role small group ministry plays in binding us together, coming to know and respect each other, and recharging our souls.

As a lay minister in the Atlanta UU congregation and a person on the brink of professional ministry, I was part of what we called a credo group, temporarily formed to help each other develop our own personal statements of faith (much as our Coming of Age youth do every year). Later we settled on meeting in a home one morning a month, and - with some change in membership as people moved on literally and figuratively - were together some 20 years.

I helped form more than two dozen small groups for this congregation, groups gathered by age and stage, gender identity, affinity, and geography. We called them covenant groups, bound by promises of right relationship, confidentiality, active listening, and suspended judgment. Bound together in a spirit of trust and belonging.

In addition to working with this UU community over a decade, I set up covenant groups in a small congregation in the Georgia mountains and met with interested lay leaders from other UU societies. As a board president and now minister with the UU Women's Federation, I cheered on and promoted small group meetings around reproductive justice. I served on the UU Small Group Ministry Network Board with people as geeky as I was (and still am)

about the up close and personal benefits of what psychiatrist and author M. Scott Peck has described as "a safe place precisely because no one is attempting to heal or convert you, to fix you, to change you.... Free to seek your own psychological and spiritual health, free to become your own whole and holy self."

I was abidingly committed to creating what Parker Palmer has called circles of trust. Twenty years later I am still committed to these circles of trust that Palmer envisions as places where we show up and speak our truths and help each person listen to their inner teacher.

Our Auburn UU Fellowship has some history of formal covenant, or chalice, groups, as well as groups that have come to serve similar functions: writing groups, drumming circles, and others. During my time with you as Consulting Minister, I would like to take a look at where we are with places to share our "ultimacy" journeys - the search for truth and meaning in our lives - in "intimate" configurations, and explore some new forms and formats for doing so.

We can only be made richer, deeper and more connected by doing so.

We had a nice al fresco lunch. Al is a great caterer.
