## ...on Religious Education

First I want to welcome all the new families who have joined our RE ranks. I also want to welcome back our returning families. This is going to be our best RE year yet. We have some very excellent things planned for this year. The first day of RE is September 24. Teacher Dedication is September 10. I hope all will join us in welcoming these teachers back!! After talking to a number of DRE's, I know that we are extremely lucky (and GRATEFUL) to have our teachers returning for another RE year.

For our youngest class we have a back to RE bash planned (without an exact date yet) that will include a day of fun playing in the water. We are also in the process of getting trained for a new program we will use in that class. It is called Spirit Play and it is excellent! I hope all the plans for the training work out and we can start the year using this new curricula.

The middle class will also have a back-to-RE event that previously was the Overnight followed by the Pancake Breakfast. This year it will only be for the middle class and will include a taste of their new curricula for the year, Jedi Academy. This curricula was highly recommended by the other DRE's I met while at RE Week at the Mountain. I am thrilled that our middle class will have a chance to use it.

The oldest class will have a new way of experiencing RE this year. My hope is that we can work it out to have a theme each week that will keep the teens out of the classroom. The goal is to have each of the three RE Sundays be a different project. The first Sunday will be Water Watch Testing. The kids will go to the river they chose last year and test the water, record the data and then enter it into the Alabama Water Watch data base. If you are not familiar with AWW, please look them up and learn how important this program has been in catching water quality changes. The other two Sundays will also have repeating projects.

This year we also will have the opportunity to attend some youth cons at the Mountain. Since I was there last week I can tell you first hand that your kids need to attend. The Mountain is a UU retreat and it is a beautiful place full of amazing people! They are offering youth cons for 3rd-5th grade on November 3rd-5th, 6th-8th grade will be on November 10th-12th and 9th-12th grade will be on December 1st-3rd. I will be contacting families with more details very soon. I encourage all of you with youth old enough to attend to put it on your calendars and make it a priority to participate.

This will be my third year as DRE at AUUF, and I am so excited that I had a chance this summer to really delve into the UU larger world. I attended an OWL training in Knoxville, TN, I attended General Assembly in New Orleans, LA, and then I went to the Mountain in North Carolina for RE Week at the Mountain. I am bringing back lots of information on creating a better RE program for this year. I am grateful for the opportunities I had this summer; it has allowed me to also connect with other DRE's that are nearby and are eager to get together for some fun UU activities. I believe that we really will have the best RE year since I have been the DRE.

## A Message from the Interim Minister


Dear members and friends,
