On Religious Exploration

The new RE year begins revving up in August, and planning is well underway. Here's what to expect.

Moving Classrooms

We are splitting our original Manatee group into two classes due to the increased number of young children attending RE. Effective class and behavior management, combined with the needs of the Spirit Play curriculum, require more space. So, all three rooms on the south side of the RE Building are being dedicated to this group.

The Padawan Learners will shift into what used to be the Peace Train classroom after work is completed in the summer to repaint and replace the floor. Peace Train, meanwhile, will relocate to the Busch Center. The specific room there is yet to be determined, but, among other benefits, this move will allow youth easier access to the service they provide in support of *Diana's Pantry*.

Planned Class Activities

The two youngest groups are continuing with last year's very successful Spirit Play curriculum. Through storytelling, Spirit Play introduces young children to our UU principles. Children then engage with developmentally appropriate work that is specific to their needs and allows them an enriching experience as they process the Spirit Play story of the week.

The Padawan Learners (who graduated to Jedi last year) are leaving a galaxy far, far away and heading to Hogwarts to connect with our UU Principles. Their RE year begins with the traditional overnight followed by a pancake breakfast served to the AUUF members in the Busch Center. This is a much loved event where the kids make pancakes on Sunday morning and the congregation shows up early, makes a donation, and enjoys a wonderful breakfast and fellowship. Don't pass up this opportunity to get to know these magical students! Look for the announcement in this issue and mark the date on your calendar.

Our AUUF near-teens and youth (AKA Peace Train) continue putting UU principles into action through supporting *Diana's Pantry* and the Alabama Water Watch (AWW) program. Service to *Diana's Pantry* involves two Sundays a month, one to inventory new food donations and the next to put together boxes of items requested by those who have a need. Also, one Sunday a month, they perform chemical testing and biomonitoring at a section of the Choctafaula Creek in the Tuskegee National Forest. The chance to be in the woods, the practice of being good stewards of the Earth by water testing and, possibly, the s'mores cooked over the campfire keeps them looking forward to this monthly event.

And, oh, by the way.... On June 23, Peace Train youth were guest speakers at the AWW Annual Meeting, and their dedication to this project was recognized with an award. Congratulations to our Peace Train youth!

Expanding to meet growing RE demand while needing to operate this year's program with half of last year's budget presents a few challenges. Committee Happenings: Ministerial Search

On Friday and Saturday, June 1 &2, the Ministerial Search Committee (MSC) met at a retreat in Opelika with Rev. Phillip Douglas, the UUA's assigned Transitions Coach for our Fellowship. Those MSC members representing AUUF are Marcia Rossi, Robert Zabawa, Ivan Phillips-Schmidt, Temesgen Samuel, Eddie Peek, Jay Schryer, Jan Newton, and Tom Hodges. Our Opelika retreat with Rev. Douglas was successful and the MSC is now beginning in earnest our journey toward settling a new minister.

On Sunday, July 8, the AUUF's first summer Picnic Potluck at the AUUF, members of the MSC will present an overview of its role and projected timeline in the search for our settled minister. Part of the MSC's task in the settled minister search is to conduct Cottage Meetings, which involve the MSC interviewing AUUF staff and members to voice their opinions about the search itself. At this point in the process, the congregation is encouraged to ponder such questions as:

- How would you describe the AUUF to prospective settled ministers?
 - To prospective members?
 - ❖ To a close, non-member friend?
- After our minister has been with AUUF for a year, what will be your measures of success?
- ❖ What achievements will make you say you are glad the settled minister is among us?

The MSC realizes that summer is a time when some AUUFers may be traveling or otherwise not in regular attendance. Not to worry! We value everyone's thoughts and opinions on this search, and we intend to continue our Cottage Meetings into the Fall, when more AUUF members will be available to attend.

The Board at Work

Over the last three months, the Board of Trustees has finalized building use policy, wrapped up the canvass and budget, conducted the Annual AUUF Business Meeting, and continued to address old problems and emerging needs. Read on for more details.

At the April meeting, the Board of Trustees put the finishing touches in place and approved the "Policy on Use of AUUF Buildings and Grounds by AUUF and Non-AUUF Groups or Individuals." With building use "solved," some problems that were compressed and quiescent made a grand entrance. One such was the management of the Playground and Nursery. Since, neither of those enterprises, surprisingly, has been the responsibility of any committee or person, the Board is in the process of working toward a solution. Another relatively new problem is reconfiguring room use in the Busch Center, and (related to that) finding more space for the RE program. Stay tuned.

The Spring 2018 Stone Soup Canvass was a product of Board planning and lots of effort. Looking soberly at the progress of the Canvass in mid-April, Board members realized that AUUF couldn't fund a full-time Minister for next year. Therefore, they approved a search for a three-quarter time Interim Minister. After the final pledges were tallied, Board members labored mightily to recraft a 2018-19 budget. Thanks to all who worked on the Canvass, especially to the canvassers and Board members, Greg Schmidt and Darrell Crutchley. Of course, thanks to all AUUFers who pledged generously.

Speaking of money, a subset of the Board participated in a two-hour webinar dealing with a UUA initiative called "Wake Now Our Vision." In a nutshell, if you change your will to include a bequest AUUF, the UUA will send us a check for 10% of the value of your bequest next summer. And when you

die (and we all do that) AUUF will benefit from 100% of the bequest in your will. Win-win, now-later. But this program is first come, first served. So, we need to get going on this before the UUA runs out of money for this! Speak to Amy or Kitty or Jerry for more details.

Flash!! Coming soon to an AUUF website near you! The latest version of *How To Do UU*, which contains our bylaws, descriptions of committees, rules, procedures, policies, folk remedies, and recipes for moonshine. It is a highly imperfect document, but the Board thought it should be out there where everyone can bask in the imperfection.

At its final meeting of the 2017-18 year, the Board unanimously approved hiring the Reverend Marti Keller as half-time Consulting Minister for next year, beginning in August. It was a joyful end to an Interim search process that was a bit of a rollercoaster ride. Space limitations prevent recounting the almost nonstop highs and lows but the outcome was terrific. Rev. Keller will cast her spell on us and we will change, grow, be inspired, and be thankful and thrilled that we're UUs. Welcome, Marti!

The Board would love to hear from you. A preliminary agenda for the Board meeting is sent out to the Board on the first Sunday of the month. The Board meets the second Sunday of the month, after potluck at 12:15 p.m. in the Busch Center. The VP of Finance, Planning...

The first Friday in December this year falls on the 7th. Mark your calendars, please, because this is the date of AUUF's largest fundraiser, the Annual Auction. Did you know that, on average, 10% of AUUF's annual budget depends on our auction? We will need everyone's efforts to make it a success.

Donations of items and services to be bid on at the auction is the first and most obvious need. Even now, 5 months ahead of time, be mindful of possessions that you are considering giving away. The beautiful, antique lamp that doesn't quite fit your décor anymore. Original artwork pieces or collector's items you've outgrown. The racing bike you were thinking of selling on eBay. Set them aside for the auction.

Are you a potter, a baker, a candlestick maker? Do you love to host groups of folks for a meal, a tailgate, a pool party? Consider the things you enjoy doing or making and offer to do or make them for (or with) others as a service to bid on. Between August and October, you will enter descriptions of your donated items and services using our on-line process. Be thinking. Be creative.

A second, less obvious, but critical need is for people to donate their time to auction <u>preparation</u>, auctionnight <u>management</u>, and post-auction <u>follow-up</u>. The auction has run smoothly over its many years, because the folks who volunteer to help run it do their tasks with dedication. Also, because it is often the same people who have been willing and able to volunteer for these tasks, repeated practice makes..."pretty darn good."

However, having done many of the myriad tasks required to put on the auction, I speak from years of experience when I say that AUUF needs for additional and, yes, less experienced people to take part in learning and "owning" these tasks. Now is the time, while the "old hands" are still around, to learn what they know, so that our most important of fundraisers will continue to be profitable for many years to come. Besides, the more people who know about how a task is done, the more flexibility there is when it comes to job-sharing or finding a last-minute replacement.

The task list below offers a general picture of what goes into pulling off a successful auction. Do you see a task (or tasks) you recognize as fitting your skills or interests? I've included the names of those who have had lots of experience with these tasks. Talk to them if you would like to find out what's involved.

Before I get to that list, there's one job above all others that is most essential: **Job Duties Manager (JDM).** The JDM recruits folks to carry out the various tasks, makes a master list of these volunteers, and keeps up with them until auction time. For many years, Ken Walters, with his kindness and persistence, ably filled this

role. Since his passing, I have filled it. But, it's time for someone else to take over, so that I can turn my attention to my additional responsibilities as VP for Finance. Please contact me if you are willing to step up.
