Summer, and the living is easy! Right? In early June, we typically take a breather from weeding, planting the garden and mulching everything in sight. The grass still grows but we usually settle into a schedule for getting it cut that doesn't leave us too ragged. Now is the time we prune the remaining plants that didn't get the treatment in April and May, fertilizing the plants that require it and monitoring for garden pests. And then the beans and cucumbers start coming in. Canning, drying and freezing ensues and generally doesn't let up until the tomatoes, pole beans, okra and squash are spent in August, or there is a crop failure, whichever comes first. Our okra harvest, of course, lasts until cooler weather sets in and the fall garden is being planted. It is always a busy summer around our house when we aren't sneaking away for a little out-of-the-yard fun somewhere else and visiting out of town friends and family before the harvest gets underway in earnest.

I am not complaining though. While many faculty and students take a summer semester break, as a staff member at Auburn, I have to stick around the office anyway. So having something rewarding to do at home is fine with me. We grow plants from (mostly) organically certified seeds and we know exactly where the harvest comes from and how it is handled, which makes us happy and as healthy as we can get, I suppose. It is not for the faint-hearted, mind you, because it is work in every sense of the word. But it is a labor of love that we have chosen even when we are almost sick at the sight of overflowing refrigerator crispers of cucumbers, squash, beans and okra. The sight of all those fresh, homegrown tomatoes on the counter can be off-putting, too, believe it or not, after having canned so much of them as we are physically able. Saying to ourselves, "Must . . . keep canning . . ." isn't really all that bad when we consider eating the fruits of our labor during the cool, rainy winter months, so we persevere.

Yes, summer living is easy when done right. I hope you all can enjoy a little fresh produce from your own yard, even if it is just a container with a tomato plant or some herbs in it. Maybe you eat or can produce from the farmer's markets. That's great, too! So, have a great summer, and enjoy the season's best offers.


We will still be holding Community Game Night during the summer. I do hope all will have a chance to come and enjoy this fun event. In the meantime, enjoy some pictures from our year!
