Unitarian Universalist Service Committee (UUSC) Rights at Risk - Cindy Reinke

The UUSC Rights at Risk program focuses on human rights crises around the world. It partners with marginalized communities in their struggle for self-determination. This includes strategic partnerships with grassroots organizations in 19 countries across five continents (http://www.uusc.org/our-work/where-we-work). In the United States partner impact and activities include:

- Created a #WelcomeRefugees guidebook to support resettlement and integration of Syrian refugees in Southern California
- Hosted a series of events where Syrian refugees could share their stories, and launched an advocacy campaign to combat xenophobia and Islamophobia
- Won a federal lawsuit reaffirming that state governments cannot discriminate against resettled refugees on the basis of religion or national origin
- Screened 1,320 formally detained Central American families to determine their need for post-release legal services
- Established a multimedia team to produce eight short-form videos to mobilize public support for ending family detention
- Published hard-hitting research showing that U.S. Border Patrol tactics directly contribute to the missing persons crisis in the borderlands.

RE Class Description:

This "Jedi Academy" will offer padawans (students) an opportunity to develop practical spiritual skills. The curriculum is separated into five training categories:

- Skill (physical training, including some lightsaber training, along with peacekeeping and how to make good choices despite forces pulling in other directions)
- Senses (Connection of the body and physical experience to spirituality)
- Courage (Mindfulness training and using that to become a positive force for change in the world, even and especially when the odds do not seem in their favor)
- Insight (Exploration of big questions good, evil, death, morality and more)
- Spirit (Spiritual practices grounded in Unitarian Universalism which will allow them to feel connected to something larger than themselves...a larger purpose, a greater strength, a sense of lineage, etc.)

All of the classes include components of all five training categories, though each will focus on one aspect. These classes are not merely philosophical discussions. This is hands-on, active training for our Jedi padawans.

Dear members & friends,

As I was getting ready to head to campus to attend the eclipse event at Auburn University, I sat still for awhile to read Annie Dillard's essay "Total Eclipse." It describes her experience of the 1979 event near Yakima, Washington. I decided not to join the many heading for the path of totality, even though it would have been a reasonable distance for a day trip. Instead, I enjoyed the company of several hundred people on the green—mostly students. It was the first day of the fall term, and I wondered how discussions would go in their classrooms afterward.

It was a moment of celebration: an atmosphere of awe and wonder and human connection prevailed. A few fluffy clouds drifted across the sun/moon spectacle briefly once or twice; the crowd grew as the maximum point approached.

Kristen Starr posted on Facebook, "I wish we could all appreciate the Cosmos this much EVERY day." Indeed! And I would add, I hope we can remember the feeling of human solidarity evoked by our various experiences of the eclipse. I hope we can remember the feelings of awe and wonder and curiosity and imagination that arose in anticipation and response to the "eclipse across America," for these are essential to our common aspirations for a just society and a planet transformed by our care!
