Of course, I also look forward to seeing you Sunday mornings!


AUUF Humanist Discussion Group

Unitarian Universalist Service Committee

It is November, typically the month during which we kick off the "Guest at Your Table" program. It has been a very busy year for the Unitarian Universalist Service Committee. In particular, the UUSC has been very involved in the fight to change US policies regarding detention and in responding to the humanitarian disaster in Haiti following Hurricane Matthew. In the wake of the hurricane, over a thousand Haitians were killed and now millions are threatened by cholera. Thousands of homes were destroyed, as were crops that were near harvest. The UUSC has a long-standing policy of working with local groups and they are doing that now in Haiti.



Here in the United States, the UUSC is working with other grassroots groups to pressure the Department of Homeland Security to close its family residential centers where immigrants are detained while awaiting hearings and possible deportation.

The Guest at your Table (GAYT) program not only provides funding for the UUSC, but also provides an opportunity for each of us to pause and remember those people around the world who are hungry, in danger or whose basic human rights are simply not secure. It's also a great way to start or renew your UUSC membership. A donation of \$40 or more earns the donor a membership and donations of \$125 or more are matched by the UU Congregation of Shelter Rock.

Unfortunately, I will be away much of November and December so we have decided to remind everyone about the GAYT program and distribute envelopes so you can send in your family's donation on your own, but I will not be collecting the contributions on behalf of the AUUF this year. You'll also probably get fewer reminders but I do hope you will find a jar or bowl to collect your loose change and donate it to the UUSC on behalf of their work throughout the world. East Alabama Food Bank:

One of the most remarkable aspects of the East Alabama Food Bank is that it provides food to those who are food insecure in so many different ways. They have programs that target the needs of different groups in ways that not only provides the needed food but do so in ways that respects the dignity of the recipients. For school children they have the Backpack program that provides food to hungry children on the weekends and holidays. The Brown Bag program reaches Lee County's elderly who live below the poverty line and the Community Market provides clients the opportunity to make their own food choices. These programs have a tremendous impact on our community and the number of individuals and families they reach are stunning. The Community Market serves 900 families a month, while the Brown Bag program reaches 560 elderly households and the Backpack program reaches over 300 children. So, this month as we enjoy our good fortune and community, let's be generous and reach out to those in the larger community who really need our help.

Please too, remember to bring your donation of non-perishable food for the East Alabama Food Bank.
